Overdue on Baldy

On Monday, December 27th, twin brothers (40 years old), began their hike via Ice House canyon, towards Kelly's Camp. That evening around 1730 hours,



they used a cell phone to call one of their wives to say they had traveled approximately 3.6 miles up canyon and were going to stay the night. They said they were in snow, and were planning to return home

in the morning. When Tuesday afternoon arrived and they had not returned or phoned home, a search was initiated.

At approximately 1530 hours on December 28, West Valley SAR received a page for a search in the Mt. Baldy area for two overdue hikers. The weather was not good. It was had been raining since the previous evening and predicted to continue through Thursday. Since this call began in the early afternoon on a work-day, manpower was going to be light at first.

Once at Baldy fire station (our usual command post for this area), it was quickly decided to send a three man hasty team up Ice House Canyon trail towards

the saddle. This is where it was assumed the subjects had phoned from the previous day. The hasty team consisted of myself, Eric Spaeth and Mervin Tapsfield. The three of us packed our gear, inventoried what each had, including WMT(wilderness medical technician) gear for two subjects and headed up trail by 1730 hours. It rained, heavy at times, until we were nearly 1 ½ miles up canyon, when it turned to snow. Snowshoes were needed for the upper parts of the canyon. By the time we reached Columbine Springs, 2 ½ miles in, we were soaked from the rain and snow fall. Even with our Gore-tex, we could not avoid the moisture. When we stopped to eat or rest, we would begin to shiver from the wind and wet clothing. Continuing towards the saddle was in question.

The three us discussed whether to continue or turn around. Considering all the variables such as, weather, our personal conditions, the fact the brothers had tents and therefore shelter, we reluctantly informed the CP that we were returning. It was nearly 2030 hours, and we felt reaching the saddle would put ourselves at risk for possible hypothermia. We were back at our vehicles at 2230 hours. Our command post staff had assembled two other teams, one to hike an adjoining trail that eventually reached the saddle and another to resume our initial assignment. For the same reasons, both of these teams returned to the CP without finishing their assignments, as well.

Canyon Runner Injured

On Dec. 23, 2004 about 2300 hrs. we were paged out for an overdue canyon runner at the top of Beryl in Rancho Cucamonga. I met Dep. Whitten, our coordinator, at the location with the Rancho Deputy, who, while checking on the abandoned car, found out our hiker was overdue by the family. Our coordinator had cell phone contact with him, and he said he was up the trail with an injured ankle. We only had 8 members responding so I started driving the powerline roads to find

access in. When the other members arrived we sent them in on the two trails we found that went into the canyons. The

subject told us he did not go past the powerline roads so we figured it would be very easy.

As the teams hiked up I was sounding my vehicle horn. The subject stated he could not hear my horn but that the ground teams all could hear me honking. We lost cell phone contact with our subject at this point. We figured he must be farther up the canyon than he thought he was so the ground teams followed the canyons up well past the roads. I drove the roads some more and found some well above the powerlines at the head of these canyons. Team 2 could not go any further in their canyon due to a wall so they headed back to the CP to get the suburban and assist me with driving the roads. Team 1 had a set of tracks in their canyon that only went up and did not return, so they kept going.

While I was driving the roads making noise, I heard our subject whistling. I found the canyon that he was in and directed Team 1, who was not far away at this time from the subject. It was about 0200 at this time. Team 1 made contact and in their evaluation the subject had a possible broken ankle and a back injury, so we had a carry out and technical rescue due

to the steep canyon. Team 2 drove up to our location and they found the quickest way into the canyon and to the subject. All our manpower was at the subject and we had no one for the rope rescue to get our subject out of the canyon. If we called the next team in it would take hours to get them there and finally do the rescue, so we called Rancho Cucamonga Fire Dept. to assist with their Technical Rescue Team. Also we requested aviation but they could not fly due to the Santa Ana winds at Rialto.

Rancho Cucamonga Fire got there quickly and made good time getting up to our spot. It was about 0400 now. The roads were tricky finding the best way around due to many washouts that were impassable. I assigned RCFD in charge of the rope operation and they set up and ran the operation. I had to leave to go to work and felt good leaving the operation in the hands of RCFD. The subject was raised in a very timely manner to the road above and was transported to the waiting ambulance at the CP by 0630 hrs. The operation went very well for the search segment of it and the following rescue for the small turn out of manpower we had. We have a very good working relation with RCFD and that paid off, since we know that their technical rescue team is very capable in canyon rescues and with working with them in the past in the front country.

Well, as you may be able to tell by the title of this article, this one was interesting. It started on Saturday Feb 5th. A simple SAR call-out, three juvenile mountain bikers

stranded in the Seven Oaks Canyon behind the Seven Oaks Dam. Real quick in and out operation, 40k2 swooped in and picked up the three then delivered them to us at the Redlands Airport. We thought this would be the end of this one, until I received a call for help from the parents of the same three juveniles, then next day.

The juveniles, and one adult decided to go back to the location behind the dam to retrieve their bikes. This would have been fine and dandy, except the storm, which moved into the area bringing snow and rain.

The three juveniles, resident of Mentone, and the one adult parent, hiked from the Bear Creek and 1N09 crossing. They had been dropped off her at 1100 hrs on Feb 6th. The plan was to have the one parent stay with the vehicle and wait for the other parent and three kids to get the bikes and return. Well come 7pm, Ruben Rocha, the parent at the vehicle became concerned; the group still had not shown up.

The San Gorgonio and Valley of the Falls SAR Teams were paged out and deployed into the area on foot and 4x4's. After searching all night, and tracking the

subjects to the area of 1N13 and 1N09, we still had not made contact with the group.

The SAR teams regrouped at the Mill Creek Ranger Station to plan our next operational period and efforts. Ground teams, along with the aviation division, hit the area once again to find these kids. 40k2 once again located the group stranded on a steep ridge overlooking the Santa Ana River, just south of the Bear Creek/1N09 crossing. Less than a ¼ mile from the vehicle. Air Rescue 7 swooped in and once again rescued the four from their predicament.

The group was tired, hungry, and cold, with some minor cuts and bruises from their endless climbing through the heavy brush. Once the group got to their bikes and started back to the vehicle, they decided to take a short cut on a flume line running from powerhouse #1 to the Bear Creek/1N09 crossing. This short cut would turn out to be a bad call. The group encountered steep terrain, and high water levels forcing them to climb the steep sides of the Santa Ana Canyon walls.

One last thing, the bikes were once again left in the canyon, hopefully never to be seen by their owners again. D

I decided to go. Heck, I could use a better pack. After swing shift I drove over to REI and found myself the only one in the lot; that was 3:00 in the morning. Good, I thought, I'll take a nap in the bed of my truck, get up at 0800 and be ready to go two hours before the store opens at 10:00. I rolled out my bag, watched an episode of Seinfeld on my laptop, and drifted off. I was so determined to be first in line that I woke up and almost jumped out of the truck when I heard the street sweeper drive by cleaning up the lot.

REI set up the sale on the front sidewalk and supplied those of us in line with free donuts and coffee. As I waited I noted the location of the packs and other items of interest. Hey . . . she?s not eyeing the packs is she?!!!!)

REI laid down the ground rules of the sale and played music by Berry White; perhaps to keep the crowd calm. Then like a flood, the line surged forward into the sale area. The sale area was small, perhaps only a thousand square feet, and

was all at once filled with at least 300+ people. I made for the packs but was beat to the one I wanted by a lady in front of me. I caught a break when the lady momentarily dropped the pack I wanted to take a closer look at the other one in her hand. I grabbed the pack, beating another fella going after the same opportunity, and went to the snow area. The Cramp Ons and snow shoes were already gone so I grabbed the smallest/lightest stove I could find. I went to the next table over and grabbed a small light. The tables were getting bare and the crowd was getting bigger. Momentarily I stopped to examine what I had and to plan my next move. That was a mistake because I was pummeled by elbows and feet. (Note to self: keep moving.) I decided to score one more piece of equipment and then make my way to the register. At the clothes area I bumped against the lady whom I stole my pack from. I quickly grabbed a blue jacket off the rack and was out of there.

Soooooooo here is how I did:

- New Low Alpine Alpanayo 90 pack worth \$154.00 purchased for \$89.83. Problem listed on tag: none. My inspection: a small area of seam needs additional thread.
- Used MSR Super Fly Stove worth \$49.95 purchased for \$24.83. Problem listed on tag: Gas would leak after valve was closed. REI marked that stove tested ok. My inspection: It works great and does not leak gas while valve is closed. (No . . . I did not test for leak with a match!)
- Used pulsar II LED light worth \$10.95 purchased for \$3.83. Problem listed on tag: Battery bad. My inspection:

Battery all right but light works intermittently unless I squeeze the switch hard.

- New Sportif jacket worth \$59.93 purchased for \$19.93. Problem listed on tag: Dirty. My inspection: Perfect!

I picked up the above gear, worth \$274.83, for \$138.32! The downside is that the gear is sold as is with no warranty.

According to the employees of REI the merchandise for the Scratch and Dent sale comes from clearance and returned

items. REI will not sell climbing gear at this sale due to liability. Each item has a tag attached describing any problem that made it not appropriate for normal retail. REI Rancho Cucamonga plans to hold this sale every three months. To be participate in the sale you must possess a REI lifetime membership, which is \$15.00 and can be purchased at the time of the Sale. See you at the next one.

Twins

There were teams in the field as trail blocks and up Lytle Creek throughout the night. On Wednesday morning, teams were again sent up Ice House canyon to the saddle. It was raining at lower elevations, with snow higher up. At approximately 1255 hours on Wednesday, Team One reached the saddle and our subjects. The two brothers had spent nearly 42 hours in their tents at the saddle. They were in good condition, but happy to see their rescuers. They quickly packed their gear and were led back down the canyon. Once at the CP, they were debriefed and reunited with their relatives.

The twin brothers had been well equipped with a 4-season tent, 5 days worth of food, light sources, foul weather gear, sleeping bags and a stove. They even had a map and compass! The two had known the weather forecasted rain and probable snow, but not until Tuesday. However, once they set camp, it began to snow continuously throughout the night. They said they dug their tent out several times. They felt they could survive two or three more days until the weather broke or until they were found. Luckily, they were found first.

As many of you know, we have been quite busy in the Baldy area this past year. This last mission will be logged as our final mission of 2004. West Valley SAR is extremely grateful for all the support we have received throughout the year by our county teams, as well as those MRA teams who have come to assist us. We hope all of our missions in 2005 end as this one did, on a good note.

Special thanks to the teams from San Geronio, Central, Cave, Bear Valley, and Wrightwood, for sending members to help on this mission. We would also like to thank China Lake, San Dimas, and Sierra Madre for their assistance. As always, we appreciate Mt. Baldy Fire department for their help. Without the use of their "home", we would be out in the cold.
